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Encountering those in need constantly challenges us and forces us to think. In the silence of our lives, we rediscovered the importance of simplicity and keeping our eyes fixed on God and the essentials of life. We realize that we need one another, that we have a shared responsibility for others in the world.


In Christmas story we learn, how to reach out to the poor from our Blessed Mother, who received the gift of Jesus himself and gave Him to the world. Listen then, Jesus tells you: "Do you know, I am the poor person. I am the poor, the migrant and the homeless".

Patris corde highlights "the creative courage" of St. Joseph, "the carpenter of Nazareth," who was able to turn a problem into a possibility by trusting in divine providence. He had to deal with "the concrete problems" his Family faced, like problems faced by other families in the world, and especially those of migrants, all those forced to leave their native lands because of war, hatred, persecution and poverty." "Consequently, every poor, needy, suffering or dying person, every stranger, every prisoner, every infirm person is 'the child' whom Joseph continues to protect." From St Joseph, "we must learn... to love the Church and the poor."

REMINISCES: Missionary Journey of Mary Glowrey

The Catholic Women's League (CWL) of Victoria and Wagga Wagga, Australia celebrated the centenary of Dr. Mary Glowrey's arrival in India during a virtual Meet on 27 November 2020. It was a momentous occasion where the General Council of the Congregation of JMJ and some of the family members including Sr. Mary Glowrey LCM, the daughter of Dr. Mary Glowrey's brother Gerard were present. Jane Munro, the out-going General President welcomed the participants followed by prayer led by Mary Long.

Rev. Sr. Innamma Yeruva, the Superior General of JMJ delivered an inspiring message on the event. Distinguishing Mary Glowrey as a 'unique gift of God', she said the Servant of God a 'good-fornothing' was 'good for eternity with a lasting vision'. Further, she highlighted some salient features from the life of Mary Glowrey that had a great impact on Catholic healthcare, the Church and the world today.

Fiona Power, the Curator of Mary Glowrey Museum in Australian Catholic University presented a PowerPoint retracing Mary Glowrey's journey from Australia to India in 1920. Pauline Adams, the grand-daughter of Lucy Connellan, the elder sister of Mary Glowrey shared about their visit to the Station Pier at Port Melbourne recently memorializing Mary Glowrey's departure to India from the same spot 100

years ago. Louise McGrath, the grand-daughter of Harold Glowrey, Mary Glowrey's brother read from a letter she wrote to the family in 1920 describing about her journey and the warm welcome she received in Guntur.



Mary Ferlin, the Museum designer, presented the Mary Glowrey Museum Christmas cards and souvenir booklet. Anna Krohn, the incoming General President and an ardent devotee of Dr. Sr. Mary Glowrey, who wrote many articles about her in *The Horizon* and other periodicals, expressed words of farewell.

In this article, I invite you to ponder over, on the struggle Dr. Mary Glowrey had undergone in discerning her call to go to India and the route she travelled. On 24 October 1915, when she experienced God calling her, to be a Medical Missionary Religious, Dr. Mary Glowrey MBBS was serving in three main hospitals in Melbourne from 1912 to 1919, as a Senior

Resident Surgeon and Refractionist Resident doctor at the Victorian Eye and Ear Hospital, Honorary Oculist at the Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital and Out-patient Physician at St. Vincent's Hospital besides her own private practice at 52 Collins Street, in addition to serving the victims of World War I.

The idea of going to India, for a brilliant doctor, a personality beyond reproach, with fine and excellent personal qualifications, a woman who already known for her indefatigable energy and determination was unbelievable. Mary Glowrey had her own difficulties with the arguments raised about her going to India, a place which was considered as an unhealthy country. But her response to them was that the need for medical mission was greater in such places. Another strong objection came from her friends who were genuinely concerned due to her weak heart as a consequence of childhood

rheumatic fever. To them her reply was that it was God's business to take care, if He really wanted her to do medical work in India.

Four years passed, yet Mary's vision of going to India was not realised. At that time, a lady doctor who was a widow with a child from India, wrote to Mary Glowrey advising not to join the Dutch sisters because they were very strong, worked too hard, they never went to the Hills for a holiday and as a result she was certain that she would never be able to go through with it all.

Mary Glowrey discreetly discerned her religious vocation over subsequent years and was convinced that it was God's will for her to go to India and she could not be deaf to His call. She wrote to her mother that there was so much work to be done in India and if she stays in Melbourne it remains undone. At the same time, she felt that leaving home would more than ever be a 'wrench'.

In 1919, she resigned from her office as the Foundation President of the Catholic Women's Social Guild with a secret plan to do her Master in Medicine which covered Medicine, Gynaecology, Obstetrics and Ophthalmology in order to be more efficient and effective in her mission. The degree was conferred on her on 23 December 1919 and a month later she left Australia on a longer journey as a missionary to India, being very well equipped as a woman's physician and surgeon, a dream fulfilled after nearly five years.

The World War I was ended and Dr. Mary Glowrey was ready with all her preparations including an eightday retreat with the Sisters of Mercy at the Convent of Mercy in Goulburn which was led by Fr. William Lockington SJ. She left her thriving career and sailed to India on 21 January 1920 from Station Pier, Port Melbourne, on board the Orsova. From Melbourne she travelled via Adelaide and Freemantle to Colombo. She arrived Colombo on Friday, 06 February and stayed at the Grand Oriental Hotel. She could have taken a train on the next day but wishing not to miss the Mass on Sunday she waited, participated in the Mass, made her Confession and on Sunday, 08 February evening, she took a train from Colombo to Talaimannar in Ceylon. The tiresome journey continued and from Talaimannar she had to travel about 22 miles by a ferry for two hours to reach the mainland of India. Then, she fetched another train and reached Madras on Tuesday, 10 February 1920.

Archbishop John Allen sent someone with a letter of welcome and he took her to the Presentation Convent at Church Park where the sisters received her with joy. Archbishop had gone to meet the Apostolic delegate (later Cardinal

Giovanni Constantini) who was on the point of leaving India for Japan. In a short time, the Archbishop along with the Cardinal invited her to see them.

From Madras she set out for Guntur on Wednesday, 11 February 1920, by train via Bezwada (present Vijayawada) and reached Bezwada in the early hours of 12 February. In Bezwada, a teacher from Guntur

met her at the station with a letter from Mother Elizabeth Helsloot, the superior of St. Joseph's Convent, Guntur, informing that he would accompany her to Guntur. In Bezwada they went to the Church, attended the Holy Mass celebrated by a visiting priest and then proceeded to Guntur. At Guntur, the only horse carriage of the town was requisitioned to take her to St. Joseph's Convent. Mary Glowrey was welcomed by the community of sisters at St. Joseph's Convent, Guntur with great joy on 12 February 1920.



On her arrival, first she was taken to the chapel, where she saw a lovely statue of the Sacred Heart with out-stretched arms above the altar and on the sanctuary were the words: "Magister Adest et Vocat Te," meaning "The Master is here, and calleth for thee," which made a deep impression on her. Dr. Mary Glowrey joined the Society of Jesus Mary Joseph on 27 May 1920 and

entered the novitiate on 28 November 1920. Mother Assumptia van Ray was her formator during the postulancy and novitiate. She made her temporary profession on 29 November 1921, perpetual profession on 29 November 1924 and lived as a loyal, committed, spirit-filled religious in total humility and surrender to the will of God.

I can do all things through CHRIST who gives me strength (Phil: 4:13)

A great achievement is the result of allocating your time, effort, energy, and hard work; being open to God's will towards what you want to achieve. This was exactly my disposition, when I was transferred to Nirmala Convent, Kadapa in 2014 to work in Nirmala Hospital, which was almost at the verge of close as it was non-functional for a few years by then.

Although, I was a bit apprehensive about my mission in such a hospital, something deep with me said 'Fear not, I am with you!'. Yes, Jesus Christ, my life's anchor had not left me alone, but accompanied me so very closely to handle the situation in such a way that made a great transformation in the lives of so many terminally ill patients.

I remember the scripture verse – John 15:16: You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit, the kind of fruit that will last and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you.

Is God going to work through me to bear much fruit and would whatever I ask in Jesus' name, be granted to me?

God's design for the future ministry in Nirmala Hospital was affirmative as I went round the town to survey, visiting the families and associating with people about what is the need of the hour to serve the people in this locality. I know then, the need for geriatric home was not a right choice as there are several already in the town. The Lord, the compassionate and gracious God, revealed His plan that there is a greater need to start a Terminally ill Patient Care Centre by which the chronically ill and incapacitated people are to be served. A great revelation of my loving God indeed!

Eventually, we took up the initial steps to begin the new ministry of caring for terminally ill with nine people. Believe and have faith in the promise of God. I prayed through the intercession of St. Antony (my family saint) to send at least 25 patients by the end of February 2015. My community joined me as well in this devotion. Miracles happen when you Believe! Precisely, by the end of February 2015, that too exactly after 25th February, miraculously 25 people were admitted. Truly, most of the admissions come on Tuesdays. From that time onwards patients have been increasing every year and now we have 60 inmates in our hospitality. We all witness the wonders of God and experience God's providential and protective hand on all the inmates of our hospice even during this COVID-19 pandemic. I believe, it is merely God's abiding presence among us (John: 15:4).

We have excellent staff with skilful hands to serve our clients with commitment. The predominant feature of our care is to reveal the love of Christ to our inmates - a place of tranquillity and peace! I am immensely grateful to God for making this new venture happen through my faith and intervention but all - for the glory of His name and for the solace of these suffering people of God.



JMJ Formation for Christ's Mission

JMJ Formation is a process of growing into the likeness of Christ. The primary aim of formation is to initiate the formee to discern God's unique *CALL* to her in resonance with the Congregation's specific Charism, Spirituality and Mission. JMJ Formation is contextualized, integral and a continuous process of updating and adapting to the ever-challenging situations of the times and needs of the world. It beckons the formee, to a process of growing into the likeness of Christ.

JMJ Formees, desiring to live in tune with the Charism and Spirituality of our Congregation, are enabled to discern, discover and respond to God's call, - to be always ready, to be sent out anywhere, for any ministry, any time; and be prepared to leave much that is dear and familiar to her, for the sake of the Lord (Mathias Wolff). The missionary spirit of our Congregation demands, a continually Adaptable Apostolic Availability, with an ever-renewed search for doing God's holy will, for the liberation of humanity.

Formation is a lifelong process that includes both the initial and ongoing formation. In this article, I focus only on the formation of novices.

Formation in Noviciate: During the period of formation, a novice tests herself, finding whether the life chosen by her, as defined in the constitution, inspires and offers her the opportunity of realizing her ideals of serving the people of God through our Congregation. During this period, the emphasis is laid on the integration of formee's human, spiritual, intellectual and apostolic formation dimensions. In addition, she is guided through personal accompaniment to grow in a deep prayer experience of 'Contemplation in action, the Ora et Labora' where she learns to live the components of interior and exterior spirituality of the Congregation.

Preparation for Apostolic formation: Towards the completion of the Canonical year, in our case the first year of noviciate, the novices are introduced to the apostolic formation, before they are sent out to the communities for such experiences in any JMJ

community and mission. Within the framework of JMJ contemporary ministries of education, healthcare, social and evangelization, they are also introduced to various emerging and relevant ministries of the Church through:

- Familiarizing personal reflection and theological dialogue techniques for effective and integral approach to JMJ life through varied the interventions.
- Teaching and integrating to respond to God's call to holiness as contemplatives in action to promote God's reign of justice, peace and love.
- 3. Launching and engaging *Laudato Si' action plans* to care for our common home the Creation.
- 4. Teaching and practicing action oriented "personal and communal Ecological Conversion" and to listen to the cry of the Earth and the cry of the Poor.
- 5. Preparing to go forth as instruments of hope into the heart of the world sowing hope for the planet and people.
- 6. Teaching to respond to the psycho-socioeconomic challenges of victims suffering from sexual abuse, migrants, refugees, people at the margins and borders of the society.

The programme of the second year noviciate is organized in such a way, that they involve themselves in one of the ministries of the community. Here the theoretical formation of the novice will acquire concrete shape through JMJ ministries. This year due to the pandemic our second-year novices might have limited chances to have experiences of working and living with the poor and marginalized.

In addition, novices are facilitated to develop personal responsibility for one's humane and spiritual progress, integration of prayer and work and above all a deeper conviction of one's call to follow Jesus and grow into His likeness. Let us accompany our formees through our prayer and blessings.

Prajwala Home: Glowing God's Eternal Flame

Prajwala means 'Eternal Flame'. I am immensely happy to share my mission in Prajwala Home, Vijayawada. Founded on 30 October 2010 by Sr. Tresa KVM our Provincial now, under the mentorship of Sr. Stella Maris, the former Provincial of Guntur Province, Prajwala is now 10 years. The drive to start Prajwala home was to flame the rays of hope in the lives of young girls and women who are exploited and abused in the Society. During this decennial period, the Eternal Flame of God's tender loving care guided us on this journey. As we celebrate the 10th anniversary, we lift up our hearts in gratitude and praise, for God's marvellous deeds and accompaniment.

Prajwala home was also called as Open Shelter home, initiated first in Satya Narayanapuram and later in 2013 it was moved to Krishna Lanka, Vijayawada. A second home Swadhar was established in Hanuman Junction in 2016 for women in difficult circumstances. Our shelter home started just with one inmate and now it accommodates 25 abused and victimised women and girls. Most of them have a history of domestic violence, illicit relationships or sexual abuse.

Objectives of Prajwala Shelter Home:

- To cater to the primary need of shelter, food, clothing, and medical treatment to women and girls exploited and abused.
- To care for women in distress, to regain emotional strength and appropriately rehabilitate them.
- To provide them legal aid and counselling, to build up self-confidence and self-esteem.
- To empower them to start their life afresh with dignity and conviction.

What do we do with them? We see them as people who have no hope to live. They are physically tortured and emotionally broken down. They feel rejected by their partners, family and significant others. The first thing we do is to build up their self-confidence and self-esteem through counselling, psychotherapy and behaviour therapy. Counselling sessions help them to

change their attitude towards life and bring significant positive change in their behaviours.





Once they go through this process, we offer them rehabilitation training like skill training in tailoring, embroidery, craft work, screen printing, making handicrafts, Jute bags etc. But for young girls who are school dropouts and beyond school age, we organize lessons and prepare them to appear for the final exams. Formal education also is given to children in school age through our JMJ Schools.

Life skills, motivational and moral education gives them hope and courage to reintegrate into their families. Once the inmates are confident to go back to their families and start anew, we summon the family and hand over them through Women and Child Welfare department and local police. We do follow them up to ensure that they do not return to the vulnerable situation again.

Pope Francis said: "I think of children and women who are victims of prostitution and human trafficking, are humiliated in their essential human dignity". Working with the victims enabled me to understand and help them better, sharing in their struggles and guiding them to regain their human dignity.

The women and young girls supported by Prajwala home are ever grateful for the love and care they receive from JMJ sisters and staff. My heart overwhelms with delight for this rich experience of serving the less privileged along with our dedicated staff. At the cross roads of their journey, we are blessed to show the Eternal Flame of God's love, hope and joy to the people we care for at Prajwala.

Empowering Catholic Families To become Christ Centered

JMJ SISTERS SERVING COVID VICTIMS AT MORNING STAR HOSPITAL

COVID-19 pandemic has not just threatened the health of millions but also wreaked havoc on the emotional and mental wellbeing of people around the world. Feelings of anxiety, helplessness and grief are rising as people face an increasingly uncertain future. Nearly everyone has been touched by loss, which raises a question: Is there anything people can do to cope with the emotional fallout of this confusing and uncertain time?

JMJ Morning Star Hospital, Raigarh was inducted by Raigarh District Administration to work with local government in the fight against the pandemic. JMJ went ahead to be in the forefront by setting a ward in our hospital to treat positive patients. In the beginning it sounded very hard and all were anxious. But our charism challenged us and stirred us to be available. When everyone looked for a secure place at home, we placed ourselves under the providential care of God. As we began attending to corona patients, we were griped by a deep fear of being directly exposed to infection but we had the hope that God who has called us, will take care for us.





Trusting on God's protection we moved forward to serve selflessly. Dressed in Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and serving for 12 hours was a very harsh experience. Donning the PPE from head to toe and staying in it for 12 hours meant no eating, drinking water or meeting even the needs. The flip side of the protective gear is that it does not allow flow of air. At times we felt as if we are about to faint. We were drenched in sweat and experienced dehydration and felt hypoxic by the end of the shift. Even with the PPE, there was anxiety as we entered the infected zone. With equipment oral communicate was also difficult but we continued serving our clients.


It was extremely challenging to care for such patients with diabetes, hypertension and other age-related issues. Providing them psycho-social support was extremely important to ease their worries and make them feel comfortable. We made sure that the patients were physically active. It helped them recover better. While trusting in God we found our fulfillment in taking care of the patients, watching them get better and returning to their homes. Patients recovering from the disease give us hope. It is a sign that we are winning this battle against covid-19 although it is not erased completely.

Patients were co-operative and followed Doctor's orders. They had the fear of losing life but thank God all of them so far recovered, being extremely happy and grateful to each one of us for the best of care they received at Morning Star Hospital. Our medical team sacrificed everything for the sake of the patients. While rendering our services to COVID-19 patients we heard them say 'Sisters are the images of God'.

We thank the Almighty for calling us to the healthcare apostolate and also, we thank JMJ Morning Star Hospital Administrator Sr. Veronica Thattil who had been helping and encouraging us to give ourselves generously in order to continue Jesus' healing ministry through our noble nursing profession. We experienced the tremendous prayerful support of our sisters from the province that kept us going in our healing ministry.


To the young sisters - You, the young sisters are the pillars of the Congregation and Church. You have the

Charged with PASSION for Mission

Sr. Martin Maliekal JMJ Shanthi Nilayam,Hyderabad.



My call to religious life in a missionary Congregation indeed is like a bolt from the blue. It all happened within a week to the surprise of all at home. Although not willing, I could finally convince my parents and proceeded to join the Society of JMJ at St. Joseph's Convent, Guntur, A.P.

As an Aspirant, I have a cherished memory of seeing Dr. Mary Glowrey, a great visionary and missionary of JMJ healthcare ministry. St. Joseph's School of Nursing was just started. Probably that's the time Dr. Mary Glowrey took up the multi-tasking job, working in the Hospital, High school as well as teaching medicine to the budding nurses while Sr. Peter Julian taught malaria treatment which was highly prevalent those days in Guntur.

Initially St. Joseph's Hospital admitted only female patients. School of Nursing yet to get recognition from the Government. So, the students had to work in Government Hospital for a period of six months, to appear for qualifying exams. St. Joseph's School of Nursing stands as the first Catholic Nursing School in Andhra Pradesh, training hundreds of nurses and staffing them both in government as well as private hospitals. Even to this day there is a lot of demand for qualified nursing staff trained at St. Joseph's.

I am privileged to recall the reminiscences of Dr. Sr. Mary Glowrey, the Founder of the Catholic Health Association of India (CHAI) which integrates the healing ministry of the Catholics across India. I had an opportunity to become an active member of the Association and worked unitedly with other catholic religious leaders in the country and abroad. I had the privilege of working as the President of CHAI for 7 years. It was a proud movement to continue the visionary work of Dr. Sr. Mary Glowrey.

During the General Chapter 1981, I was elected as the General Councilor from India. After completing twelve years of my office in The Netherlands, I returned to India in 1993 and the same year, I was appointed as the Provincial Superior of Hyderabad Province. During my term as the leader of JMJ, I could explore different ways and means for the personal growth of the sisters and development of the mission. Those years of my office gave me a great challenge to redefine and evolve new ways of JMJ presence in the world.

I recall with satisfaction, the founding of 'Shanthi Nikethan' in Kurnool, the Care and Support Center for the HIV/AIDS patients as our Charism demanded. My happiest time is caring for these patients, who are abandoned by their families. I remember sitting with the dying patients, praying for them holding the Holy Rosary in one hand and with other hand making the Sign of the Cross on their foreheads reciting the Hail Mary until they breathed last. Such lived-in-experiences often left me with tearful eyes in silence and solitude. What gave me fulfilment is - when the new patient enters Shanthi Nikethan, he or she knew that they would be loved and cared for and that someone would say a kind word to them as they pass through this life to heaven.

God put into my heart a passion for caring of the children of the victims of AIDS. I had all the time in the world for them, to take them to my bosom, to feed, bathe and teach them. My only wish and prayer for them now is that the divine providence keeps them happy.

On realizing that I am over 90 years and my body is weakening, I responded to the call of the then Provincial Superior Sr. Celine Alapat, happily accepting to be transferred to JMJ Shanthi Nilayam in Hyderabad, to rest, relax and prepare for the Great



God's Protection and Providence

Born in Patha Reddipalem, Guntur district of AP on 5 Oct.1942, I was a much-treasured child born after 7 years of my brother's death. My parents lost their first-born male child at the age of five and said that I was a gifted child of God, a fruit of their prayer. Sr. Stella Maris JMJ is my younger sister. At a young age I was inspired by my cousin Sr. Stephini Maria JMJ (late) to study at St. Joseph's Guntur. In spite of my father's unwillingness, I joined in 3rd class staying in boarding. After three months, I was admitted in St. Joseph's hospital under Sr. Dr. Mary Glowrey for typhoid. With no hopes of recovery, I was brought home. In utter helplessness and great sorrow my parents turned to God to heal me through the intercession of St. Alphonsa. Answering my parent's humble prayer, God blessed me with miraculous healing, of which my classmate Sr. Anna Gertrude JMJ is an eye witness. Sadly, a year later I lost my beloved mother in St. Joseph's Hospital during delivery. Situations moved from bad to worse. My father did not allow me to continue to study for two years, and later I was admitted in 5th class at St. Joseph's where my cousin Sr. Stephini was a great support to me.







I joined the Society of JMJ in 1958 after my S.S.L.C. After my first profession in 1961, my provincial offered me to choose a profession. I chose to join in nursing but after six months I was asked to go to college to study B.Sc. God's ways are different! In 1964, I was sent for medicine in St. John's Medical College, Bangalore. I completed MBBS in 1970. Since then I worked in various JMJ hospitals.

In March 1976, I was sent for P.G in C.M.C Ludhiana, Punjab. An incident which took place in May that year had changed my whole life. It was Sunday my day off. After holy mass, I was preparing for a conference, then I had an unusual call to come for duty as the duty doctor was ill. In five minutes, I reported on duty, helped my colleague with a hot drink and took to her room. Then a young girl of 15 years came to see me, whom I do not know. As I was talking to her I heard a loud noise like a bomb blast and something collapsing. At once everyone came running to me and said since you are a sister, God saved you! What actually happened was the roof of my room came down completely in ruins. I never saw the girl again. In this incident I realized God's plan to save me for a particular purpose (Jer. 33: 3) to spread the gospel message through healing ministry. If had I refused to go, I could have been dead under the rubble in that room. From then on, I rededicated my life to God and resolved never to say 'no' to anyone who needs my help at any time.

During my PG studies, I had to undergo two surgeries within 6 months in Hyderabad which left me with jaundice, due which I had to almost discontinue my P.G. Again I was miraculously healed and restored to health. A year later the then Mother General Sr. Louise van Laarhoven (late) encouraged me to complete my P.G. Hence, I went back to Ludhiana and completed successfully my P.G.

I thank God Almighty for His wonderous ways of love, support, care, goodness, providence and assurance of His presence. He has worked many miracles in my life. If have I to write it would be a book.

I am grateful to our Congregation, to all the sisters with whom I lived and worked for their love, encouragement, help and support.





I enjoyed being with children, instilling in them creativity and pleasant learning experiences. The smiles on the faces of children and their innocence often reminded me of what Jesus said: "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." Poor students had a special place in my heart and I tried helping many such children to successful career.

As Missionary in East Africa - In 1961, I was sent as a missionary to Mwanza in Tanzania, East Africa along with Sr. Lucy Chiramal. In response to the invitation of Bishop Blonjous of Mwanza Diocese to educate the poor children of his diocese, our Society has sent out seven missionaries (5 Dutch and 2 Indian) to Tanzania to work in two places. Sr. Lucy, two Dutch Sisters and I were sent to Mwanza. I become nostalgic as I relive those wonderful days. As a young dynamic and courageous missionary, I always wished to be a true daughter of Fr. Mathias Wolff. I wonder, how I was able to render 12 years of service along with the Dutch missionaries, adapting myself to the local culture and language. My heart would exhale in happiness whenever I speak with my Dutch companions in Kiswahili, the local language of Tanzania. Such was the joy of my missionary life. My students kept in touch with me for many years after I returned to India. I have volumes to say about NYAKAHOJA (Holy Family) Primary School at Mwanza which is so dear to my heart till today.

Life as missionary in Mwanza - My mission journey in Mwanza was something that still enthuses me. People were very good-mannered, respectful and supportive to sisters to develop the place. I enjoyed my life working in Nyakahoja School, Mwanza, because we lived with one spirit of JMJ -








Black, White and Brown together like in hymn we sing 'walking with Lord'- black and white and brown together walking, walking...' Our school was developing well and reached to 7th standard at that time. All of a sudden, at a time when none of us even dreamt of it, we were asked to leave the country due to Civil War between Tanzania and Uganda. It was a dreadful moment to leave Mwanza with mixed emotions of sadness and gratitude. We had to just leave the Country only with our bag, leaving everything behind, donating to St. Theresa Sisters of Bukobo an African Congregation.

I was delighted to revisit my dear mission country in 2002, along with Sr. Greet from The Netherlands as the NYAKAHOJA School celebrated its 40th anniversary. After returning from Tanzania, God chose me to be an animator in several communities, being a loving sister to my fellow sisters. I tried to live the spirit of the Founder and our missionaries who set a great example of self-sacrifice for the sake of missions.

My humble advice to our younger generation: Be passionate for your mission. Compassionate to the poor. Responsible to live your commitment. Grow in deep love and loyalty to the Congregation. Emulate the rich spiritual legacy of the Founder. Always remember the apostolic Zeal of the missionaries. Be ready to be a missionary. Be generous in loving and caring others without counting the cost. Possess a broad vision with a kind and gentle attitude to yourself and others.





Pastoral Care during the Pandemic

How can we accompany people through this valley of anxiety, fear and death?



Here are 10 brief guidelines.

- 1. Monitor and follow the health guidelines. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC), the World Health Organization (WHO), and your state health department are monitoring the situation closely. Follow their guidelines. Stay healthy yourself. Model for others how to show up without panic. Providing basic and accurate information can be part of pastoral care.
- 2. Be a non-anxious presence. Being calm, emotionally present and free from anxiety inspires trust and provides the right kind of care in this pandemic. For caregivers to show up non-anxiously means managing our own emotions or anxieties. People borrow our calm and compassion to assist them in reducing their own anxieties.
- 3. Show up for people, even if it's not in person. "Avoid close contact" is becoming a mantra in this crisis, especially for people over 60. We can be connected with people digitally. It is not the same as being able to reach out and hold a hand. Yet, we are fortunate to have these viable options, so use them with care to offer support.
- **4. Listen in love.** No matter what turn the pandemic takes, one of the most enduring and powerful gifts we can offer is to listen. By listening we embody the love of the sacred, the love of a wider community, the love of life itself. Compassionate listening is exactly what people need during the crisis.

- **5. Find ways to make community.** The human desire to be helpful is incredibly strong. Although a crisis may lead some people to withdraw, it can also be a significant opportunity to pull together and support each other through organized, caring, and sustainable ways.
- **6. Help people to be hopeful.** Find ways to remind people that God's loving presence and providence is there always. It can help us maintain a sense of hopefulness about God's loving presence in our lives, even when circumstances threaten to dim our hope.
- 7. Keep values alive. In times like this, our job is to call on people to live as best human beings in the world. It means to live our values, leaning into God's sustaining presence, loving our neighbours, and facing life or death with the same faith and values by which we faced life so far.
- 8. Don't be afraid to talk about death. Helping people grieve well—before, during, and after losses—helps them live better in every area of life. Making space to talk about death means expanding our capacities to live each moment as a gift.
- **9. Pray.** Prayer greatly helps people who are apprehensive. Perhaps the better path is the prayer of participation. We participate in God's life and one another's lives by praying, by meditating in silence and renewing our sense of purpose, by bearing honest witness to the situation.
- 10. Take care. Remember that you, too, are a finite and limited creature. Tend to your own needs. Lean into your own community for support. And take turns with others giving care. Sabbath is not a luxury. Selfcare is not selfish. As this outbreak continues to unfold, take steps to renew your own energy and hope in the Spirit of God.




The Lord is my companion in social isolation.

JIPC: Call to save the earth

IPIC gestures of Solidarity from the LAND OF GOLD

In tune with JPIC, JMJ Ghana region is contributing a lot after being aware of the cries of the earth and the poor. In appreciation to the call of our Congregation through the online workshop, all the sisters along with our lay collaborators have rededicated ourselves to generously serve the poor and sick in our care.

I like to underline the major activities in promoting the integrity of the humanity and the earth. To radiate the light of the Gospel, Catholic Teachings and JMJ Charism, our work begins each morning with inspirational quotes at morning devotion by our Chaplain.

JMJ congregation as a pro-poor Health care ministry is underpinned by: engagement, empowerment and support for the cause of the poor. For any community to qualify as a site for JMJ health facility, it has to be: underserved, remote from the urban community and population under below the poverty line. JMJ over the years has modeled out a number of interventions to render quality care equally to both rich and poor in a friendly and personalized manner.

For JMJ Mathias Catholic Hospital 'sick and poor fund' is set aside to enable people who cannot afford to pay their hospital bills. JMJ registers them with National Health Insurance Scheme (NHIS), so that they have access to same care as those who can afford. Furthermore, JMJ facilitates a welfare package for staff which allows them meet their medical bills regardless of the category. Members of staff are registered with the National Health Insurance Scheme together with their family.







JMJ Mathias Hospital identifies brilliant but disadvantaged students and sponsors them for higher studies in health-related programs within the country. In partnership with community leaders and other stakeholders, JMJ offers a number of liberating activities namely: Scholarships, Sponsorships and Community debars. JMJ Ghana Region sponsors poor children at various levels of education (Primary, Junior, High and Senior

schools). Also supports poor but brilliant students after completing Senior High School at KBK to pursue University courses of their choice including medical studies both within and outside the country.

JMJ communities are supporting under privileged domestic employees by assisting them financially in building up houses. We also assist some needy people in the community in small scale business such trading of their choices.

Yeji community is engaged in Prison ministry. We support the prison inmates conducting health camps, providing them food, clothing, detergents and footwear to enable them feel respected and loved. Periodically, our community educates commercial sex workers, councils and rehabilitees them and transports them back home. In collaboration with the Lilliana Foundation we are caring for medical treatment and education of physically challenged and hearing-impaired children.

Most aged population suffers from chronic Diabetes and Hypertension to that effect, our JMJ hospital runs specialized clinics tailored to address these specific needs of the aged. There is also an eye clinic which addresses the visual needs of the aged and all patients requiring such services. A lot of blindness is as a result of cataract. Our team outreaches people in their locality and registers cataract cases. On well planned dates they are transported in our hospital Van at no cost to the patients to attend cataract camp and undergo surgeries free of cost. Ever since 2016 till date we have restored sight to over 5000 elderly.

For the drug addicts and alcohol dependents the mental health clinic is there to address these problems. The Anti-Retroviral-ART clinic sees the HIV/AIDS patients once a week on Thursday. JMJ health facilities are not just institutional, but community led outreach services to the hard to reach communities, reaching out to the poor in the rural and urban slums.


In summary the core values of JMJ namely – respect for human dignity, preferential option for the poor

and dignity of labour and care for our common home are what we promote through our health and education ministries to the needy, marginalized and neglected and thus we take upon ourselves to improve the living standard of the communities we serve.

Ghana growing Green

We are happy to let you know that JMJ Ghana is truly growing in our relationship with God of creation, with others, with ourselves and with our mother earth! In response to the cry of the Earth, every JMJ community in Ghana has become conscious and busy planting all types of fruit and flower bearing trees to restore, preserve and enhance the ecology. The under listed programs are our Clean and Green programs aimed at preserving the sacredness of mother earth: Planting for Health, Planting for Life and Planting for Food. These programs are implemented in collaboration with some selected schools in the community where the young children are educated on the importance of growing plants to a healthy life. Students are supported with seedlings to plant in their schools and homes and in areas depleted of vegetative cover.

At the inception of JPIC early this year, efforts are made to sensitize members of staff on the initiative. The clean and green program has been the practice in our campuses, with some staff dedicated to maintaining the vegetative cover.

We feel nostalgic to see, that furthering the efforts of the pioneers by the present generation of sisters, taking JMJ social apostolate forward, creating a great difference in the lives of the people under the banner of a full pledged organization of JMJSSS, establishing for itself a public image.









Kudos to Sr. Nirmala A, Sr. Joshi K, Sr. Denin Mary and their co-JMJ sisters and collaborators for reaching out with a message of Laudato Si through varied activities related to environment protection, and 'going green' in the areas of work among the people in rural hamlets. The efforts of JMJ SSS to prevent air, water and soil pollution and helping to grow own vegetables, reducing use of plastics, providing safe shelter and making positive impact on the Mother Earth in the following ways through different groups and programs are praiseworthy and examples to emulate -

- Bapuji Children Parliament distributed hundreds of plants and organic seedlings received through Forest
 Department to the villages to encourage and promote eco-friendly environment.
- Women leaders under JMJ Self Help Groups helped to distribute and grow Agri-related and Organic seedlings in their respective areas. The organic seeds are used for kitchen gardens.
- Gandhiji Children's Parliament at Salepadu village brought the mosquito breeding problems to the notice
 of the Prime Minister, which led to the discussions and measures to control the mosquito menace in rural
 India.

- Responding to the cry of the Earth, we have observed the Laudato Si week long initiatives and Season of
 Creation programmes caring for Creation. We also take part in another movement 'Fridays for Future
 Movement' a Global Campaign to 'Save Climate' started by 'Greta Thunberg' (Young Climate Activist)
 from Sweden.
- JMJ SSS participates every year in Vanamahostvam program organized by Guntur district collector. Divisional Forest Officer gives to JMJSSS 1000 plants every year to be distributed in the villages.
- Green mission: We encourage our women groups in the villages to grow 'kitchen gardens' by providing them organic seeds and manure to grow organic plants. 500 members in three villages planted these seeds and after harvesting they have also collected the seeds for re-plantation. Green mission accomplished by JMJSSS is appreciated and celebrated by the beneficiaries, public and local panchayats as well.

Preferential option for the poor is our priority. JMJSSS has always been very close to the poor people in many ways. We adapt underprivileged localities from urban and rural areas, empower them through our socio-economic interventions, initiatives for self-reliance of women through self-help groups, providing health care facilities, helping the elderly poor to get government pension, education to school drop-outs, aiding the differently abled children, providing shelter and rehabilitation to young women and girls in difficult circumstances.

The urgency of the situation calls for immediate, holistic and unified responses at all levels - local, regional, national and international. We need, above all, "a peoples' movement" from below, an alliance of all people of good will. As Pope Francis reminds us, "All of us can cooperate as instruments of God for the care of creation, each according to his or her own culture, experience, involvements and talents." (*LS*, 14)

The Seven 'Laudato Si Goals'

Truly, COVID-19 has made clear how deeply we are all interconnected and interdependent. As we begin to envision a post-covid-19 world, we need above all an integral approach as everything is closely interrelated and today's problems call for a vision capable of taking into account every aspect of the global crisis." In order to attain this aim, the dicastery has planned out the Seven Laudato Si' Goals (LSG) that address a range of areas related to sustainability and ecological conversion.

- Investment in renewable energy

4. Simple Lifestyles

- Moderate in the use of resources and energy

- Adopt more plant-based diet, less meat consumption.
- Greater use of public transport.

5. Ecological Education

- Re-design educational curricula for integral ecology.
- Create ecological awareness and action.
- Promote ecological vocation of young people, teachers and leaders of education

6. Ecological Spirituality

- · Recover a religious vision of God's creation
- Encourage greater contact with the natural world in a spirit of wonder, praise, joy and gratitude.
- Promote creation-centred liturgical celebrations.
- Develop ecological catechesis, prayer, retreats, formation, etc.

7. Community Participation

- Promote advocacy and people's campaigns.
- Care for creation at all levels from local to global.
- Encourage rootedness in local territory ecosystems.















JPIC Promoters Formation Workshop



Congregation of JMJ organized an engrossing online workshop on 'JPIC Promoters Formation' from November 3 - 6, 2020. About 250 JMJ sisters from India, Africa, USA and Rome attended sessions. Overall, the four days sessions were well structured and organized, moderated by Sr. Vijaya Udumala, the General Councilor. The zoom meet at USIG platform was efficiently hosted by Sr. Christina under the guidance of Sr. Florence, UISG expert.

The purpose of the workshop was realised by imparting the basic information on JPIC with an overview to Laudato Si', to facilitate our Provinces, Region and Community JPIC promotors to develop strategies that promote JPIC initiatives in the Congregation.

3 November 2020

The first day's sessions commenced with a prayer followed by key-note address by the Superior General Sr. Innamma Yeruva. She highlighted the key areas of the workshop - Launching Laudato Si', Sowing hope for the Planet, UNs Sustainable Development Goals and responsibilities of Promoters at different levels in the Congregation.

The day's sessions were dealt by an expert speaker on JPIC, Sr. Sheila Kinsey FCJM, the Executive Co**Sr. Aruna Gopu** Bharatmata Convent, Raipur



Secretary, JPIC Commission, Rome. The four sessions comprise: Call to Holiness, Overview JPIC & Laudato Si', Sowing Hope for the Planet and Laudato Si' & Contemplation.



Sr. Sheila emphasized that we need an integral approach as "everything is closely interconnected". Thus, JPIC is the conscious prayer and action to transform the world in the spirit of the Gospel through lives of justice, peace and care for the integrity of creation. Referring to JMJ spirituality and charism, she said, living the Laudato Si Goals namely: "Response to the cry of the Earth, Response to the cry of the Poor, Ecological economics, Adoption of Simple lifestyles, Ecological education, Ecological spirituality, Community involvement & participatory action" need to permeate in all JMJ ministries.

4 November 2020

On day two, Fr. Vincent Anesthasiar, CMF, Congregational JPIC Secretary, Rome presented two topics JPIC and Religious Vows and UN Systems & Opportunity for the Missionaries. Speaking on JPIC and Religious Vows, he challenged all with an insightful example to reflect on our life styles as Religious. Where do you belong! To the Centre or the periphery? Often, people at the periphery are the poor, deprived of their

basic human rights. Living religious vows authentically, should help us move towards periphery. Quoting Micha 6:8, he said – "To act justly is poverty; To love tenderly is chastity; To walk humbly with your God is obedience". This movement to the frontiers or peripheries happens when we are prophetic listeners, discerning the will of God, becoming agents of change and prophetic spiritual community.

The session that followed next was on *UN Systems & Opportunities for Missionaries*. The key message was, the global problems that cannot be solved at the level of the country or congregation, missionaries have the opportunity to represent to the UN for global collaboration to effect global solutions.

Fr. Joshtrom Isaac Kureethadam SDB, Coordinator of the Sector on Ecology and Creation at the Vatican Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development has brought to us very practical ways of living the Laudato Si' Anniversary Year Plan 2020-2021 & Launch of 7-Year Laudato Si' Action Platform. He invited to walk with the Church and put Laudato Si' into ACTION. He inspired by a simple metaphor of Honey bees – if honey bees extinct ... then what happens to humanity!

Further, Fr. Joshtrom shared innovative ideas about Laudato Si Living Chapels, LS Gardens, LS Tree initiatives, LS Plastic Bank, LS Bible Contest and the Roll out Plan for a 7-year Journey that provoked the participants. He also shared about Seven Laudato Si' Goals (LSG) that open to us holistic approach of keeping vulnerable people at the centre of our care.

5 November 2020

Fr. Vincent presented a session on *UNs Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)*. Building on the principle of "leaving no one behind", the UN emphasizes a holistic approach to achieving sustainable development for all. They address the global challenges we face, including poverty, inequality, climate change, environmental degradation, peace and justice. The SDGs can be achieved through the **5 Ps** – People, Planet, Prosperity, Peace and Partnership at all levels.

Fr. Kevin Hughes, MHM, Professor at St John's Seminary & Missio, from Wonersh, England, spoke on two relevant topics: *Church Social Teaching and Social Analysis: Pastoral Cycle - See, Judge, Act.*The Church's Social Teaching (CST) is a rich treasure of wisdom about building a just society and living lives of holiness amidst the challenges of modern society. With human dignity at its center, CST includes Call to family and Community participation, Right and duties, Dignity of work, Option for the poor and vulnerable, Solidarity and Care for creation.

Social Analysis: See, Judge, Act: It's a reflection and action process for decision making. It is necessary that JPIC promoters examine justice and environmental problems very carefully, before they take action to solve these problems. Social analysis is a vital tool to uncover the root causes of social injustice.

Speaking on Networking and Collaboration, Sr. Sheila Kinsey proposed to strengthen networking & collaboration within and beyond the Congregation and to build on gifts and strengths of other organizations and NGOs as a means to promote greater inclusion and foster the spiritual gift of communion "wemysticism." Developing the capacity to act locally, regionally and internationally is vital in building relationships to promote common good of humanity and the creation.

6 November 2020

First session on JPIC Congregational Framework & Promotor's Responsibilities was presented by Sr. Sheila. The key points include: JPIC is an attempt to live out the charism and identity of the Congregation. It needs to be integrated into the life of the Congregation to build the Reign of God of justice and peace. The task demands evangelical discernment of the social reality, identification of structures of injustices, determination of the root causes of the problems affecting the world and assimilation of teachings of scriptures, social teachings of the Church and congregational documents.

Personal reflection for JPIC Promoters is to use *JPIC Methodology: SEE, JUDGE, ACT* through insertion experience, social analysis, theological reflection and concrete action plan.

Best Practices: The Province and Region JPIC Promotors presented by Videos and Ppts very captivating and stirring presentations on Best Practices of Laudato Si and Season of Creation, moderated by Sr. Sheila. The virtual audience was left wonder struct viewing innovative inputs and Sr. Sheila appreciated the creative hard work done by the sisters in the Congregation.

JPIC Commitment: On behalf of the Congregation, Superior General Sr. Innamma Yeruva read out the JPIC Commitment, while others holding the symbols of commitment, followed in reflective silence. Excerpts of JPIC Commitment is as follows:

We, the Sisters of JMJ, commit ourselves to both personal and communal conversion, and wish to move forward together compassionately, in an integrated effort, in response to the cry of the Earth and the cry of the Poor. We go forth as instruments of hope, empowering the vulnerable people to human dignity, and safeguarding the creation.



VIRTUAL CONFERENCE: JPIC in JMJ Formation



It is with great joy, I present an overview of two days (12-13 Nov. 2020) virtual 'Conference on Justice, peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) in JMJ Formation' relevantly convened by our Congregational Leadership Team. This online JMJ Formators Conference offered the Formators a deeper understanding of JPIC and how to integrate the spirit of JPIC into initial and ongoing formation programmes in the Congregation. The Conference was attended by 70 sisters comprising of Provincial Superiors, Council in-charge for formation, Formators, Community animators, Members of International Spiritual Animation Commission and International Formation Team.

JPIC mission is to transform the world in the spirt of the Gospel through contemplation and sacred action, leading lives of justice, peace and care for the integrity of creation. The primary objective of the Conference was integration of JPIC in Formation programmes with special reference to Pope Francis' Encyclicals 'Laudato Si' and 'Fratelli Tutti'.

Day I: 12 November 2020

Sr. Rachel Oommen ICM, the vicar general of the ICM Congregation speaking from Rome, inspired the participants with experiential anecdotes on the topics

of 'Formation for a prophetic religious life', 'Formators' commitment to JPIC in the spirit of Laudato Si' and 'Integrating JPIC in different stages of formation'. She emphasized on the paradigm shift in religious formation from information to transformation of the formees, giving them experienced based formation. Integration of JPIC in Formation should generate passion for God and humanity among formees. Referring to JPIC Formation Itinerary, she said option for the poor who is God's image, ought to be in-grilled in the formees right from the beginning.

Her sessions set a tone on the essence of consecrated life as Passion for God's Kingdom and Formation for mission of Christ, permeated by the Founder's Spiritual Patrimony and Charism of the Congregation. She invited the participants to reflect on - What is your profile as JMJ? What are the non-negotiables of your Congregation?

Day II: 13 November 2020

Sr. Patricia Murray IBVM, the Executive Secretary of UISG, Rome spoke on Pope Francis' new encyclical "Fratelli tutti" on Fraternity and Social Friendship and its application in Formation. Explaining the contents of the encyclical, she elicited upon using the Pastoral cycle – See, Judge and Act as a method of discernment using experience, social analysis, theological reflection and action.

Sr. Sheila Kinsey FCJM, the Executive Co-Secretary, JPIC Commission Secretariat in Rome, inspired the participants on "New approaches to initial Formation" asserting not to hesitate bringing in newness, in attitude, approach and process of formation. Referring to the document of the CICLSAL on Consecrated life: New Wine in New Wineskins, she said it's all about breaking through the structures and finding the way of the Gospel to be at the service of humanity.

Presentation of Formation Programmes: Formators from India and Ghana have presented creatively various stages of formation programmes using Ppts and Videos. The session was moderated by General Councillor Sr. Chandra Thainese. The Participants greatly valued the presentation and appreciated the formators for their commitment in formation ministry with an overview to integrate JPIC in JMJ formation.

The Way Forward: Rev. Sr. Innamma, the Superior General did make an appeal to consider this as a call of the Universal Church to listen to the cry of poor and cry of the earth and aptly respond to the signs of times by revitalizing JMJ formation programmes. She called upon the formators to update the Formation directory incorporating relevant Church documents and JPIC.

Final Remarks: Sr. Mary Karickakunnel, the General Councilor appreciated the formators for their indomitable spirit in JMJ Formation and encouraged every one for a renewed and transformed commitment. She expressed hope that this Conference would bring in, a definitive change and transformation in our formation programmes.

All the participants expressed gratitude to God and applauded the General Council for organizing an impressive and relevant Conference on JPIC in JMJ Formation that has made great impact on them.

The Conference ended with an affirmation to integrate of JPIC into JMJ Formation, focusing formation on mission with passion for Christ and passion for humanity and creation; responding to the call of the Universal Church to embrace the mission at the frontiers, rooted in contemplation and guided by the Holy Spirit.

Intercultural Journey of Jesus; Personality and
Culture; Culture and Gender; Socio-centric /
individual-centric: Power-Distance; Interculturality
and Spirituality; Interculturality and Spirituality:

Congregational Charism/Heritage; Interculturality & Leadership and Interculturality and the Digital Age

Why a UISG course on Interculturality and Leadership?

"Interculturality is the vision and hope of mutually enriching and challenging relationships with people who are others, who are different from us. How we build the other is not by walls of discrimination and indifference but by bridges that promote the richness of cultural diversity in the spirit of the Gospel. The image we have used is the garden: how I can enter in the garden of the other, how I let others enter in my garden." It's about how we integrate our faith and our cultures in the congregations.

Every religious congregation following the way of the Gospel, "need to work on Interculturality as witnessing community and that process needs commitment, time, space and energy. We need to keep trusting in the Spirit, the same Spirit who accompanies us always, since the first Christian Community. We are all called to interculturality, with an intentional attitude of appreciation and respect for diversity of cultures."

The salient features of the Course

- Creating awareness on the richness of Interculturality – in initial and ongoing formation, encouraging and celebrating the diversity, nourished by our spirituality and charism of belonging to an intercultural congregation.
- Creating respect for cultural differences allowing the different to be different, and developing processes that encourage openness to change and

transformation in community life and mission. Promoting within the congregation the appreciation for diversity of cultures, being attentive to minority cultures.

 Nurturing JMJ Charism which is very rich, dynamic and prophetic in terms of adaptability and availability for the sake of mission in different cultures and countries and promoting unity in diversity. Charism and Spirituality of the Congregation needs to be translated and incarnated into different cultures.

Finally, the present and future religious life to be intercultural and witnessing to the Gospel, we must accompany the members and promote spiritual growth by appreciating the Intercultural diversity: Being supportive, sharing in collective mission, developing others, giving praise and appreciation for every culture, fostering mutual respect, motivating and bringing the best in others, recovering positively from failures and searching different perspectives.

Father Wolff explains to the sisters all the figures in the painting as well the meaning of the symbols and invites sisters to compare their life with the original spirit of the Congregation.

What is the external identity of a Sister of JMJ?

Congregation's Cross and Ring

We wear a simple uniform, religious dress, adhering to the norms which bear witness to our Consecration. Our identity is recognized by our Congregation's Cross and Ring. (C. 47)

The cross she wears calls to her attention that she must always be prepared, even delighted, to endure much for the sake of her bridegroom.

The ring reminds her of her vow of fidelity. She must always bear in mind that, just as ring has no end, so also her love for Jesus may not have an end. (SBL, 79)

The Cross every JMJ Sister wears symbolizes

Love: Christ chose to die for us, sinners, and this choice is made in love. God showed His great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners (Rom 5:8).

Humility: Christ's death was an act of His willful humility. Christ hung on the cross with a purpose. Jesus humbled Himself in obedience and died a criminal death on the Cross (Phi 2:7-8).



Sacrifice: Laying aside His Divinity, He was born a helpless baby, completely dependent upon others. During His public ministry, He faithfully carried out God's plan all the way to His death on the cross. (Rom 12:1–2).

Service: Jesus said "I did not come to be served, but to serve and to give my life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45). Christ's supreme act of service was dying on the Cross so we might have eternal life.

As Sisters of JMJ, we are constantly invited to die to our will, as Christ did. Our life's prayer taught by Founder Mathias Wolff is "Change me into Thyself ... May my happiness on earth consist in fulfilling Thy holy will." Christ calls us to deny ourselves and follow Him through sacrificial service to others (Luke 9:23).

And just like Jesus, it is our responsibility to become symbols of love, humility, sacrifice and service involving ourselves in the Salvific Mission of Jesus.

Meaning of the imprints on the two sides of the Cross

Meaning of IHS (on one side of the JMJ Cross)


The Christogram IHS (Iesus Hominum Salvator) is monogram symbolizing Jesus Christ as Savior.

In 1541 Saint Ignatius adopted the *monogram IHS* as an emblem to represent his newly founded order, the Society of Jesus. JMJ Founder Fr. Mathais Wolff, being a Jesuit used this *monogram* on the one side of the Cross to indicate Jesus Christ as Savior of us all.



Hearts of Jesus and Mary on the other side of JMJ Cross

The joint devotion to the Hearts of Jesus and Mary formally started in the 17th century. The Hearts of Jesus and Mary are mentioned explicitly in the New Testament. Luke 2:19 states: "Mary kept all these things pondering them in her heart", and Luke 2:51: "His Mother kept all these things carefully in Her Heart". John 7:38 refers to the heart of Jesus: "From His Heart will flow rivers of living water."





JMJ Ring with the imprint of Crucifix

The crucifix image on JMJ ring represents the path of transformation. It reminds us of the narrow path that we constantly need to choose. It means to die and rise with Christ. We find this in St. Paul. "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me" (Gal 2:20).

Jesus' Crucifix proclaims that love is more powerful than hatred, compassion triumphs over oppression and vulnerability overcomes power. The Crucifix invites us to put our trust in God, even in the face of dismay, oppression, cruelty and death. God is with us. God feels and suffers deeply with us.

We wear the ring with the imprint of the crucifix as a sign of our total commitment to God following the path of Christ crucified faithfully till the end of our life.



Vatican Museums : Nativity Art

The depiction of Jesus' birth is itself a simple and joyful proclamation of the mystery of the Incamation of the Son of God." These words of Pope Francis recall how the birth of Jesus has inspired generations of artists throughout history to evangelize through beauty.

A splendid night-time scene of the Nativity and the Annunciation to the shepherds, in which St. Joseph is depicted as an old man, shown from behind as he sleeps next to a dead tree, which alludes to his exclusion from the birth of the Son of God. The two women near Mary—who are the midwives of which the apocryphal gospels speak—represent those people who believe (the woman who looks toward the Virgin) and those who doubt (Salome, who turns her back). In the background an angel lights up the sky appearing to the shepherds. But the supernatural light which radiates from the Child, placed humbly on the ground, is much brighter.

"In the stable at Bethlehem, Heaven and Earth meet.

Heaven has come down to Earth.

For this reason, a light shines from the stable for all times;

For this reason, joy is enkindled there...

With the humility of the shepherds, let us set out,
During this Holy Night, towards the Child in the stable!
Let us touch God's humility, God's heart!
Then his joy will touch us and will make the world more radiant."
